Admissions to Bachelor's of Social Work

Admission to the Social Work Program occurs while students are enrolled in SWK 2389, and must be completed by the first class day of their first Junior semester.

Since admission to the BSW program occurs when students are enrolled in SWK 2389 or SWK 2362, students who want to transfer these courses from other schools must complete an application to the program PRIOR to enrolling in the upper division (300 or 400 level) social work classes, or within the first 3 days of the semester.

The BSW Admissions Committee will review any applications from transfer students immediately in order to allow continuation in upper division social work courses. Social work degree plans are completed at the time of admission to the program (during the latter part of the sophomore year) by the students and the BSW Director.

For students to enroll in junior-level classes, a “permit” is required. This will allow the BSW Director to ensure all students enrolled in upper division social work classes are qualified to do so. In addition, it will allow any transfer students to be assigned to a faculty advisor at that time.

Students submit an application form, a narrative statement of their interest in Social Work, an example of their work from a previous course, three references, transcripts, and estimates of grades from current professors. Application forms are available online. The Admissions Committee comprised of the instructors for SWK 2361, SWK 2389, and SWK 2362, will review each application to the major.

Admissions criteria include:

1. Completion of the required Liberal Arts perspective (English Composition; American History; American and Texas Government; Humanities; Science, including Human Biology; Speech; Math; and Foreign Language and/or Cultural Anthropology as the Behavioral Science courses).
2. A Grade Point Average of 2.5 in PSY 2301; ANTH 2351; SOC 1306; SWK 2361; and estimated grades for SWK 2389 and SWK 2362).
3. An overall Grade Point Average of 2.5 or greater.
4. Evidence, from classroom observations of the three instructors, of
 - a. Values compatible with the social work profession, as reflected in the NASW Code of Ethics and Department Code of Conduct
 - b. good attendance habits,
 - c. good written and oral communication skills,
 - d. acceptance of diversity in others,
 - e. adequately developing self-awareness,
 - f. acceptable growth in empathic interviewing skills, and
 - g. potential for success in the upper division coursework and field practice.

Admissions to Bachelor's of Social Work

Students who have not met all admissions criteria, but are likely to be able to do so prior to entry into Field Practicum, may be admitted on a conditional basis, with a plan for remediation.

Not everyone is well suited to become a professional social worker; therefore students are assessed for their appropriateness to serve people who are very vulnerable or dependent. Those students not admitted will be advised on whether to take remedial action or to select another program or major. Junior and Senior level social work classes are restricted to those students who have been fully or conditionally admitted to the program.

The admissions criteria have been developed based on the faculty's experience. They are designed to help ensure that students who are admitted to the program are likely to succeed in the program, and have potential to become competent and valued members of the profession.

Academic Advising

Academic advising is helpful to ensure the completion of all requirements in a timely manner. Students are expected to meet each semester with their assigned academic advisor.

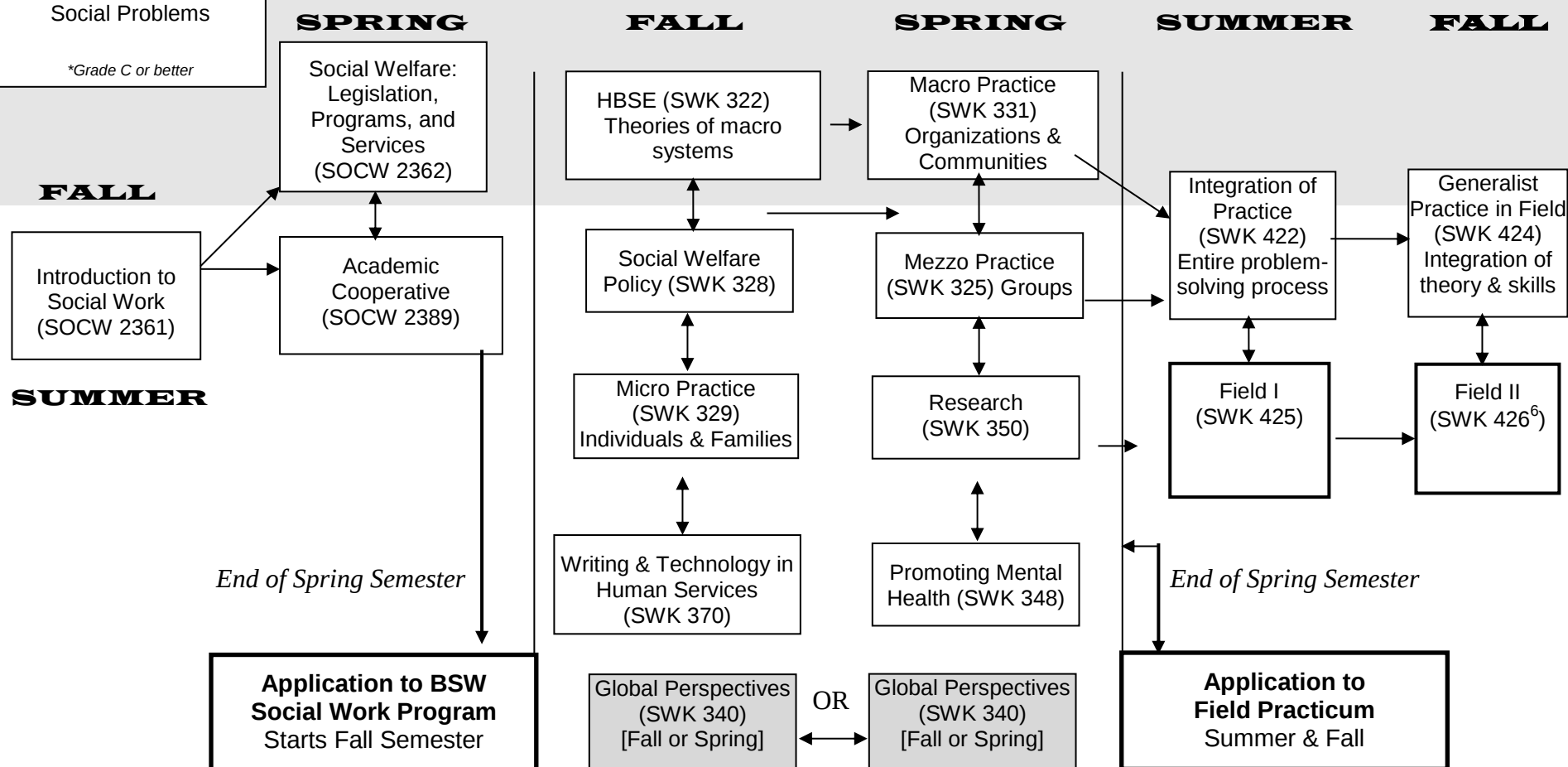

- *Must be enrolled in the Field Practicum*

Application forms are available in the Social Work office. All forms must be completed in duplicate; one remains with the local chapter and one is sent to the national offices. An advising transcript must be attached to the application.

In addition, students should attach a check payable to “Alpha Delta Mu” in the amount of \$25. Twenty dollars is required by the national organization and the remaining five dollars goes to the local chapter to finance a senior reception at the end of the semester.

1. The BSW Program Application is filled out during enrolled semester or once pre-requisite courses SWK 2361, SWK 2362 and 2389 are completed.
2. BSW Application period opens Tuesday, March 1, 2022.
3. **Completed** BSW applications are due to the Social Work office: **Friday, April 15, 2022**
4. **Type** the information on the application and print. Staple the **typed** narrative to the application; sign & date both the application **and** narrative.
5. Request three (3) professional references - these can be *employers, supervisors, or faculty from other educational programs*. Complete the top portion of each reference form.

DO NOT use personal references - No family or friends.

6. Code of Conduct must be signed and dated. Provide current transcripts/degree works printout and complete COEHS advisement guide.

7. **A complete admissions packet includes:**

- **Typed** BSW Application signed/dated,
- **Typed** Narrative signed/dated,
- Typed paper you have submitted to one of your previous courses- This can be from any class- must be around 3 pages in length.
- Three (3) Professional Letters of Reference, NO FAMILY OR FRIENDS
- Code of Conduct signed/dated,
- Transcripts or Current DegreeWorks printout,
- Headshot photo- can be self take, must look professional

School of Social Work Code of Conduct for Social Work Students

The School of Social Work expects all social work students to conduct themselves in an ethical, professional manner, consistent with our profession's Code of Ethics.

Preamble of the NASW Code of Ethics: The primary mission of the social work profession is to enhance human wellbeing and help meet the basic human needs of all people, with particular attention to the needs and empowerment of people who are vulnerable, oppressed, and living in poverty. The mission of the social work profession is rooted in a set of core values. These core values, embraced by social workers throughout the profession's history, are the foundation of social work's unique purpose and perspective:

- Service
- Social justice
- Dignity and worth of the person
- Importance of human relationships
- Integrity
- Competence

Professional ethics are at the core of social work. The profession has an obligation to articulate its basic values, ethical principles, and ethical standards. The *NASW Code of Ethics* sets forth these values, principles, and standards to guide social workers' conduct. The *Code* is relevant to all social workers and social work students, regardless of their professional functions, the settings in which they work, or the populations they serve.

Accordingly, we expect social work students to demonstrate courtesy, respect and support for fellow students, instructors, clients, and all other persons. While the values of the profession are codified in the NASW Code of Ethics, we feel that the following additional standards of behavior are to be exhibited as well by all students enrolled in our program:

- 1. Accountability** – Attend class, arrive on time, return from breaks in a timely manner • Participate in activities and assignments in a level comparable to peers • Complete work in a timely fashion according to directions • Be prepared and engaged in the learning process.
- 2. Respect** – Treat your peers, instructors, and all other persons with dignity and respect at all times • Listen while others are speaking • Give constructive feedback when appropriate • Approach conflict in a cooperative manner • Use positive and nonjudgmental language.
- 3. Confidentiality and Boundaries** – Treat any personal information that you hear (or read) about a peer or an instructor as strictly confidential • Maintain information shared in class as confidential • Use judgment in self-disclosing information of a personal nature in the classroom (Class time is not therapy or treatment – seek a referral if you need it) • Never use names of clients or disclose other identifying information • Exercise clear and appropriate boundaries between yourself, other students, your instructors, and in other professional relationships.
- 4. Competence** – Apply yourself to all your academic pursuits with seriousness and conscientiousness • Meet deadlines given by your instructors • Constantly strive to learn and improve your abilities • Come to class prepared • Seek appropriate support when having difficulties • Take responsibility for the quality of completed tests and assignments • Strive to achieve greater awareness of personal issues that may impede your effectiveness with clients.
- 5. Diversity** – Strive to become more open to people, ideas, and creeds that you are not familiar • Embrace diversity • Maintain speech free of racism, sexism, ageism, heterosexism, stereotyping, etc. • Exhibit a willingness to serve diverse groups of persons • Demonstrate an understanding of how values and culture interact.
- 6. Integrity** – Practice honesty with yourself, your peers, and your instructors • Constantly strive to improve your abilities • Commit yourself to the academic discipline of citing other people's work properly • Acknowledge areas where improvement is needed • Accept and benefit from constructive feedback.
- 7. Communication** – Strive to improve both verbal and written communication skills as those skills are the benchmark for effective professional practice and helping relationships • Demonstrate appropriately assertive communication with peers and instructors • Practice positive, constructive, respectful and professional communication skills (both verbal and non-verbal) with peers, instructors and all other persons.

All students enrolled in BSW or MSW classes are expected to observe the tenets of the NASW Code of Ethics and the Social Work Student Code of Conduct. Students who violate these may be asked to meet with appropriate Social Work faculty (instructors or Program Directors). In addition, the department's Academic and Professional Issues (API) Committee is responsible for dealing with academic and non-academic student issues when requested by faculty. The API is comprised of the various program directors and is chaired by the Director/Department Head. The decisions or actions of the API are considered the final say of the department. Students may be disciplined or dismissed from the program for violation of this Code of Conduct. Students have the right to appeal any decision to the Dean of the College of Education and Human Services, as specified by university policy.
